#### 2021 AATE/ALEA Conference



AATE/ALEA NATIONAL CONFERENCE BRISBANE 7-9 JULY 2021





The 2021 AATE/ALEA conference was hosted by Queensland from July 7-9 2021, but held online as a consequence of the COVID-19 pandemic. The theme was 'Challenge and Change: Contemporary Literacy and English Teaching'. The conference was co-convened by ETAQ and the local ALEA council. With a strong line-up of First Nations presenters, The Garth Boomer address this year was given by Kamilaroi woman, Dr Melitta Hogarth. Specifically for secondary teachers, other popular speakers included academic and writer Associate Professor Anita Heiss, writer Dr Benjamin Law and poet Ellen van Neerven. Due to the online nature of the conference, the full registration cost for three days was a very reasonable \$250, which resulted in a pleasing 461 registrations. A special thanks is extended to those who served on the steering committee, our colleagues at ALEA, including co-convenor Dr Linda Willis, and ETAQ members, Fiona Laing (original co-convenor), Dr Lindsay Williams (coconvenor), Garry Collins (treasurer), Dr Kelli McGraw (program committee co-chair) and Heather Fraser (social committee co-chair). Thanks also to the many other ETAQ members who assisted in various ways during the planning stages and throughout the conference, and to QUT for providing space for our conference hub. ETAQ members Ellen McGuigan and Kara Robinson received Copyright Agency Cultural Fund scholarships to attend the conference.

#### Assisted attendance at conferences

Debbie Owens (editor of *Words'Worth*), Fiona Laing and Heather Fraser were assisted with early bird registration to attend the national conference.

#### **AATE - National Activity**

In the past twelve months, besides the usual editions of *English in Australia*, AATE has published *Novel Ideas: Teaching fiction in the middle years* edited by Erika Boas and Rosie Kerin which was shortlisted as the best Secondary Teaching Resource in the 2021 Educational Publishing Awards Australia. This and other popular AATE texts were supported by webinars demonstrating how they can be used to support English teaching. For the second time in as many years, the national



conference was held online. As Queensland was hosting, a longer report is provided elsewhere. AATE, however, was the professional conference organiser for the conference, with Wendy Rush and Jared van Abkoude showing great initiative and resilience in managing the complexities associated with the conference. Feedback has been given to the national council on how the national office staff can be supported in managing future conferences. The 2022 AATE ALEA national conference is being held in Darwin. As members will know, a review of and public consultation on the *Australian Curriculum: English* was conducted during 2021. AATE was consulted during this process, advocating on behalf of members throughout the country. AATE's financial position has improved again in the past twelve months and is on track to meet the goals approved by the national council.

#### **Publications**

For the second year Deb Owens, as editor of ETAQ's journal *Words'Worth*, has encouraged a diverse and informative array of contributions for English teachers' professional reading. Contributions to the first edition for 2021 reflected and supported ETAQ's focus of *Challenge and Change: Actions and Ideas*. In each edition for the year the status of creative writing in its multiple forms stood out as a significant point of focus for teachers across the year levels. Not to neglect the analytical, in the second edition *Challenge and Change: Ruminations and Reasonings*, some contributors reflected on their experiences of the first iteration of the new senior English suite of syllabuses whilst others shared their experiences of presenting advice to teachers and students in preparation for the External Exam texts. In the third edition *Challenge and Change: a Wealth of Words* contributors engaged readers with a wealth of words and knowledge shared across and through the shout-out voices of subject English teachers.

#### Digital Technologies

#### Online website resources

In 2021, ETAQ continued to shift our focus toward developing, growing, and supporting our online resources. The pandemic has accelerated our efforts to make professional learning more widely accessible.

As always, our website (<a href="www.etaq.org.au">www.etaq.org.au</a>) offers a range of functionalities, including online registration for professional learning events, online membership sign-up and payment, and a member's section in which resources from various professional learning sessions are available to our members. We also house previous editions of both *Words'Worth* and *English in Australia* in this section, with links to back catalogues to the national body's (AATE) website.

Teachers in schools covered by corporate membership and non-members are also able to sign up to receive e-pistles and other news items which are regularly mailed out. This service reaches over 2500 subscribers.



#### Engagement with social media

Our engagement within our social media platforms has significantly increased, with many people joining and participating in online discussions. ETAQ recognises the invaluable support network that the Facebook Group, in particular, helps to foster. Moderation of our online platforms is a particular focus to ensure we maintain a respectful and professional tone for all communication.

#### Competitions

**IEUA-QNT Literary Competition 2021** 



The number of entries submitted to the 2021 IEUA-QNT competition continues to exceed expectations. Queensland students this year reflected on the challenges of the world in which they live in their writing. Dystopian and science fiction genres were extremely popular. Not surprisingly, themes connected to global warming and the impact of the pandemic underpinned a majority of senior short stories. In the younger year levels, students wrote about a diverse range of topics and utilised the conventions of a wider variety of genres, including fantasy, mythology, fairy tales, and reflective texts. The poetry category for all year levels continues to attract high-quality poems, which demonstrate quality craftsmanship and the ability to elicit an emotional response. In the Non-fiction section, essays skilfully drew on conventions of journalistic writing and addressed thought-provoking topics. The challenging times in which we live have inspired many young Queensland writers to produce exceptional pieces of literature.

#### Joint Council of Queensland Teacher Associations

JCQTA is prioritising advocacy for our members in 2021 and 2022 as we continue to work with the evolving situations influenced by COVID.

The current JCQTA executive consists of Danielle Gordon (ETAQ), Sheryl Saunders (MLTAQ), Phillipa Greig (BTAQ), Jackie Mergard (STAQ), Angela White (Adolescent Success) and Anne Wood (ETAQ), so ETAQ is well represented in this state association. The 2020-2022 strategic plan outlines the goals of JCQTA as:

## Goal 1: Establish and maintain connections to advocate for improved recognition of teacher associations.

In line with Goal 2, and supporting professional learning and collaboration, JCQTA has, and will continue to offer support through:

- Professional development, eg. Governance training and information
- Promotion of all members at the Teach QLD Career fairs held in Brisbane
- Availability of secure storage space in Coorparoo
- Annual Presidents' dinner (this year, in May)

JCQTA continues to be agile in ways of communication and collaboration as they take up the opportunities digital conferencing offers, and ETAQ is committed as a willing partner.

#### Conclusion

The past two years have been transformative for ETAQ. The theme of our professional learning program was 'Challenge and Change', an apt focus for our times, and particularly prescient in the circumstances. We have faced tremendous challenges, but the changes that have resulted have strengthened our ability to realise our core mission, particularly for teachers beyond the south-east corner of our vast state.

It seems clear now that our professional learning must continue to cater to a digital audience. The Management Committee is pleased that we've been able to return to in-person events at various points in 2021 and feel that this is still an essential way of connecting and learning together. Simply put – we cannot take a backward step from here and must reflect on how we continue to improve our online offerings. Our experience in convening the 2021 AATE/ALEA Conference validates these conclusions.
